FOOD, FUN AND FELLOWSHIP

June 2017

How often have you heard this phrase used in Methodist circles (and beyond, for all I know) to describe a forthcoming social event?

Now slightly stilted, it still has the attractive pull of the 'a good time was had by all' variety to persuade us to buy a ticket and come along on the day (or night). With memories of church socials past now fading, we no longer expect to see rows of seats placed the length of the two long walls of the church hall opposite each other, the one side filled with women and girls and the other with reluctant men, the boys sliding across the newly polished floor between them.

But we still have the fun – even more so – for this is an uninhibited age in which sociability comes naturally; and we still have the food, in abundance more often than not, be it faith, church catered or a mixture of the two.

And beyond the church social, what of our fellowship?

Our Holy Habits experiences have been based on attempting to see into the lives of ordinary people trying to come to grips with a recent event like no other and remodelling their behaviour accordingly. We are not alone in this attempt and certainly not the first; among others, the Wesley brothers had their 'Holy Club' in the early 1730s, but that seemed stronger on intellectual discovery than it was on human interaction and relationship.

I am by no means disparaging intellectual activity. Indeed I would guess that as many of us come to Christ by an intellectual route as through a purely emotional experience – and for most it is probably a mixture of the two in varying proportions.

But fellowship is to do with living together, to reacting to each other, to sharing each other's joys and pain, to empathising with one another's condition. Obviously, these attributes are most obvious in the bonds of kinship (which are demonstrably not confined to the human race).

Something similar also extends to those to whom we are not related but nevertheless have some affinity, whether by allegiance to some mutual section of society, organisation or club, country or circumstances.

Further afield we are drawn to consider who our neighbour is; we have instincts to behave helpfully, charitably, even generously towards others, even when we may not know them.

Moving on to the fruits of the fellowship described three paragraphs ago, it produces feelings of wellbeing, stability, security and esteem deriving from the knowledge that one is part of a group where every member is valued and goodwill extended to all. No wonder then that surveys tend to show that churchgoers are happier and live longer than the rest!

As our Holy Habits continue long after our current journey of exploration concludes, how much nearer are we to developing into a community of love, tolerance and neighbourliness, looking outwards as well as inwards to seek to share the good news and our portion of God's love with our 'neighbours'?

Hopefully, we will continue to explore, grow, develop, witness and share as we play our full part in the fulfilment of our prayer "Your kingdom come..."

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 22

'Lord of all hopefulness' Words by Jan Struther (Joyce Placzek)

Jan Struther was the pen name of Joyce Anstruther, later Joyce Maxtone Graham and finally Joyce Placzek (1901–1953).

The life and times of Mrs. Miniver was the subject of Jan Struther's most famous stories. They were published in 1939 and formed the basis of a Hollywood film in the Second World War, starring Greer Garson and Walter Pigeon. It is said that the quiet courage of Mrs. Miniver helped to persuade President Roosevelt that the USA should help Britain in the war. Jan Struther was a Londoner living in New York, where she promoted her book and the film during the war. She was also a regular contributor to various magazines.

This attracted the attention of the Reverend Percy Dearmer who was editing the words for a new edition of the hymn book 'Songs of Praise' which had been published in 1925. Dearmer had already employed a young Ralph Vaughan Williams as the music editor. Dearmer asked Jan Struther to write twelve hymns. One of those hymns was 'When a knight won his spurs in the stories of old' written to fit an old folk tune which Vaughan Williams liked – 'Stowey'.

Struther's daughter, Janet Rance in the Songs of Praise programme from the Berkshire Downs at the riverside at Easter 1986, talked to Roger Royle. She remembered her mother's eager approach to life, her many hobbies, and her love of botany which had attracted her to the Berkshire Downs. She loved wild flowers and Janet recalled that the last thing she was looking at when she died was a wonderful bunch of roses.

'Tea and Chat: Food, friends and fellowship' by Honor Harris and Judith Marrell. Published by The Leprosy Mission International at £5.95.


'Tea and Chat' was first reviewed here in September 2010 and has been reprinted to reflect our Holy Habits theme of Fellowship.

With autumn coming, with its cooler weather and darker evenings, what is better than to put the kettle on and have cakes or cookies and make friends? After all, the bible tells us to offer hospitality. (Maybe in 2017 you don't want to wait for autumn!)

Some of these recipes state which of the ingredients are available as fair trade. There is a recipe for gluten free cookies and one of the recipes is for a 'tea and chat loaf' which is fat free. Each recipe has a picture of how the finished product should look and is followed by comments about food, some of which are by famous people.

Honor Harris (named after Saint Honoré, who in France is the patron saint of bakers and pastry makers) has been cooking for years and once cooked on a live 'Get Set Cook' show when her team won. Judith Merrell has loved cooking for a long time. She has previously written books for Scripture Union including 'New Ideas for Creative Prayer'. The profits from the sale of this book go to support the work of The Leprosy Mission in hospitals and rehabilitation workshops abroad.

BOOK OF THE MONTH - 'The Shack' by Wm Paul Young



The book to be discussed on 18th June at 7.00pm is a novel by a Canadian author who initially wrote the book for his children and a few friends, who persuaded him to publish. It reached the top of the New York Times paperback best-seller list, selling over 10 million copies.


It tells the story of Mack whose younger daughter is kidnapped and killed while they are on a camping trip. Four years later, he receives

a mysterious note from 'Papa', a name his wife uses for God, asking him to visit the shack where his daughter was killed. There he encounters the three members of the Holy Trinity who help him overcome the grief of his loss and his feelings of guilt.

It is a fascinating, if somewhat controversial story which challenges one's religious conceptions. A clever twist at the end leaves several questions unanswered.

CHURCH CONTACT LISTS

Both concern information that generally gets recorded manually throughout the year ready for appropriately-updated printed publication in the early autumn.

a) Members Contact List

FLOWER MINISTRY

BREAKFAST AT MEDIA CITY

July 2013 had some exceptionally hot weather. On Saturday 21st the heat continued and I was very busy all day, as I had been all week. We had our tea early as the band was playing in Goostrey, where we were giving another in our series of concerts which had already raised over £10,000 for St. Luke's Hospice in Winsford.

We returned home late and didn't get to bed until past 2.00am. At 4.25am I woke feeling very hot and could not push the duvet off. I had to wriggle across the bed to get out and wondered what had happened. 30 minutes later I woke again and tried to go to the bathroom. I fell over, struggled up and fell over another 3 times.

Then I was all right, but having seen the stroke adverts on TV I told Mart I needed an ambulance as I knew it was stroke. He asked me to get dressed and he took me to Stepping Hill. I told the Triage Nurse what had happened and fell over again. This time I didn't recover and I was sent by ambulance to Salford Royal Hospital. I had a brain scan and they performed 'Thrombolysis' which is the injection of a drug to dissolve the clot in my brain.

Mart was booked to play at the Retirement Service for the Minister at Low Leighton Methodist Church in New Mills that morning and he asked me if he could go home to ring the Minister and cancel, as the injection was going to take an hour. On his return I told him my speech had come back and he said, "You've got your face back too". I knew my left arm and leg were affected and my speech was weird, but had no clue that my face had slipped.

I felt very poorly all day, but late in the evening I was able to be helped out of bed to go a couple of yards to the bathroom in the small ward. Next day I was feeling much better and I was allowed to go home late in the afternoon. (I should have gone back to Stepping Hill but they had no bed for me, and as I didn't live alone they allowed me to go home.) We were sorry to miss James Tebbutt's last service at Poynton, but Mart was able to go to see him later on his way home to say our Goodbyes – we had planned

to go straight to Church from New Mills that morning after the service there finished.

Following this, I was approached by the Stroke Association and asked if they could write an article about my experience and this was published in a booklet featuring ten other people, all with our photographs.

Recently, I had a call from the Stroke people and asked if I would go on the BBC 1 Breakfast Show the next day with a lady doctor to talk about my experience. After I had agreed I had a call from the programme to chat about getting there in good time as it starts so early. They also advised me not to wear red or I would clash with the sofa!

We were up at 5.00am and at 6.20am there was a shiny, black Mercedes Hybrid outside our house waiting to take us to Quay House in Media City, Salford. We were to wait in the Green Room and were given tea and coffee. I was then asked to go to Make-Up! Before 8.00am we were waiting outside the studio and then taken in while Charlie Stayt and Sally Nugent were reading the news. There were two cameras and I stood quietly with the doctor until they signalled us to sit on the sofa.

Charlie and Sally asked us a few questions while an item was being broadcast and then it was our turn. Claire, the doctor, answered questions and said how important it was to remember the word 'FAST', i.e. F for face, A for arms, S for speech and T means Time to get help. I was asked about my own experience of having 3 minor strokes in an hour and what happened. When it was time for us to leave I told Charlie and Sally it was very nice to meet them and we crept out of the studio.

As we always watch Breakfast they seemed like old friends and the studio was so familiar! The driver was waiting for us and drove us home again. We were glad we didn't have to drive there and park our car!

OBERAMMERGAU PASSION PLAY 2020

In 1633 Bavaria was swept by a plague epidemic. More than 80 lives were lost In Oberammergau alone. The elders vowed that if the village was purged of plague they would perform the 'Play of the Suffering, Death and Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ' every 10 years. The epidemic came to a standstill and in 1634 the villagers fulfilled this solemn promise for the first time. Ever since, they have loyally kept their vow.

The world-famous Oberammergau Passion Play, still staged every decade, is due to be performed again throughout the summer of 2020. This will be the 42nd Passion Play season. The play follows the story of Christ's Passion, beginning with His entry into Jerusalem and ending with His Resurrection and Transfiguration.

In 2010, 37 people from the Poynton churches (including a few friends from outside Poynton) enjoyed an 8-day holiday which comprised return flights from Manchester to Munich, coach travel to see the Passion Play including 2 nights staying in the village of Unterammergau and 5 nights Dinner, Bed and Breakfast at a lakeside hotel on Lake Garda.

For 2020 a similar itinerary is anticipated, with the choice of 'second centre' destination to be decided in the coming months (e.g. Italian lakes, Austrian Tyrol, Black Forest, Rhine Gorge, ...) as well as the total duration of the holiday (likely to be between 8 and 12 days).
