MUMBLINGS FROM THE MANSE

Cast your minds back to September 2013 and the first time you ever heard (or perhaps read would be more accurate) my mumble from the manse. Can you recall what I talked about? No, well as Tom Jones might sing 'it's not unusual' after all this time. In fact it might well work to my advantage because just like sermons can occasionally be adapted, edited and then repeated, so too can minister's letters in church magazines. Especially if the moment is appropriate.

Back in September 2013, just after my arrival here, I wrote about how life is like a series of trapeze swings. Most of the time, I hang on for dear life to my trapeze-bar-of-the-moment which carries me along with a certain steady rate of swing. As it does so I feel that I'm in control of my life. I know some of the right questions and even one or two of the right answers. But every once in a while, I look ahead of me into the distance, and see another trapeze bar swinging towards me. It is empty.

I know that in order for me to grow, to take the next step in becoming the person God knows I can become, I must release my grip on the present, well-known bar and for some moment in time hurtle across space before I can grab onto the new one. Each time this occurs, and it has already happened innumerable times in my life, I am filled with fear. Not so much the fear of the unknown but the fear of losing what I do know, the fear of letting go, the fear of change, the fear of being transformed.

Of course I could stay exactly where I am, doing exactly what I have been doing but if I am really honest, somehow to keep hanging onto that old bar, that old life, that old me, is no longer on the list of alternatives. So I take that physical and metaphorical 'leap of faith', with no guarantees, no safety nets, and no insurance policies. Well except that 'someone else' will always be there with me. And so for a moment that lasts a microsecond but can feel like a thousand lifetimes, I soar across the space that lies in between the

bars. The past is gone; the future is not yet here. I simply exist in the moment of change, the moment of transition.

Now to many people this transition zone can come across as a scary, confusing, disorienting nothingness that must be rushed through as fast and as unconsciously as possible. What a wasted opportunity! Between you and me I have a sneaking suspicion that these transition zones, these times of change, these moments of transformation are the only thing that is real, and it is the bars on which we spend most of our time swinging that are the illusions we dream up to avoid the occasions in life when real growth occurs.

Whether or not my hunch is true, it remains that these transitions in our lives are incredibly rich places even with all the pain, fear, disorientation and feelings of being out-of-control that can (but not necessarily) accompany change. They are still the most alive, most growth-filled, passionate, expansive moments in our lives.

Being transformed into new creations has nothing to do with making fear go away, but rather with giving ourselves permission to 'hang- out' in the space between trapeze bars. It's about resisting our need to grab that new bar, any bar as quickly as possible and instead just allowing ourselves to dwell for a moment in the only place where change really happens. It can be terrifying. It can also be enlightening, in the true sense of the word.

As we enter month two of 'Seasons Of My Soul', which deals with the issue of transition and change, and as I begin to look for a new home from September 2018 and you begin the search for a new minister, my question for you is simply this "Are you ready to join me in letting go?" Who knows, if we do it together, one day we, as a family of faith, might truly learn to fly!

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 25 'O love that will not let me go' Words by George Matheson (1842-1906)

The Reverend George Matheson could have spent time on the banks of the Firth of Clyde, in the Argyllshire village of Innellan. In his Victorian world, paddle steamers would pick up trippers regularly at the pier, no longer there, and take them to Rothesay on the Isle of Bute where the great Charles Haddon Spurgeon preached to crowds of 20,000.

As alcohol was only supplied on Sundays to 'travellers' at that time, it was reported that on one occasion fighting broke out, and the effects of much drinking were evident on the return journey.

A minister of the Church of Scotland, Ian Bradley, has studied Victorian hymns and given us a credible picture of Matheson. It is a well known tragic love story. When Matheson was only 18 months old his mother realised that he had something seriously wrong with his eyesight. He always enjoyed singing and acting and at the age of seven he had stood on a chair, with his family as congregation, and preached a simple sermon. At the age of 18 he could barely see, but he was popular with his fellow students at Glasgow University where he was academically brilliant in his studies of Art and Divinity. But increasingly, as his eyesight worsened, he found himself isolated in a dark and lonely world. But this isolation helped him develop his imagination which made him a gifted poet and preacher.

His preaching was not the evangelistic style of Spurgeon, but he spoke of the hard road that led to God. To Matheson, God was ever present even in the wilderness of the Highlands and in his own parish of Innellan, sheltered from winter storms by the high land to the west.

The familiar story is that in his sadness he wrote the hymn 'O love, that will not let me go', on the day he was rejected by the woman he loved because she felt that she could not marry a blind man. Matheson described the poem as the quickest composition he ever wrote. It was done in three minutes.

The writer and broadcaster Ian Mackenzie, also a minister, sees the poem as all about love. In it he says, Christ's life and death can show us that in surrendering to God, we cannot avoid pain, but we will overcome it.

Even this hymn was censored by the Assembly of the Church of Scotland at one time. If the hymn was to appear in their new hymnal, the phrase, 'I climb the rainbow ' must become 'I trace the rainbow through the rain' 'Climb' was pure imagination and not possible! They failed to understand the vision of the blind preacher. References: Gen.9.16; John 8.12; 10.28; Rom.8.38-39; 1Cor.13.

Following a meeting between Rev John, Annie Truman and the leaders of our Young Church and Evolve groups, we are going to start something new beginning on 8th October. We need to find something appropriate to engage the teenagers we currently have in church as well as attracting others.

One of the current hot topics amongst teenagers is the Netflix series '13 Reasons Why' which looks at all of the separate and yet interlinked events that cause a young girl attending high school to take her life. This series picks up on many issues that are relevant to young (and older) people today i.e. social media abuse, bullying, love, self esteem issues, relationships, peer pressure, sexuality, gossip and lying.

On the second, fourth (and on occasions fifth) Sundays of each month, after starting off in church our youngsters will leave as normal, except that we are now inviting a group of interested individuals from across all ages of the church to join them in their discussions, linking the issues in that TV series to our Christian faith.

This might be within the church building or more likely in one of the cafés or eating establishments along Park Lane. Once these issues have been explored we will find something else that is currently 'trending' among our young folk and attempt to plug into that in the New Year.

All of those present at the meeting were very enthusiastic about the possibilities this new venture offers not just for our teenagers but across the generations within the church.

CAFÉ CHURCH: AN EXPLANATION

You may have noticed a proliferation of 'café church' being advertised recently and wondered either (a) what is it or (b) why?

Put simply, Café Church is worship that is in a café-style setting: tables and chairs, drinks and cakes. After the first attempt as part of 'Worship' last October the feedback received from the teenagers was that it was the best worship experience for them. Many of us who like a cup of tea or coffee to hand would agree!

At the Worship Committee in January it was decided to develop Café Church, with a suggested time of **4.00pm** on a Sunday. It would be geared for Secondary age+ and there would be no Evolve on those Sunday mornings. Richard, Sally, Helen and I have

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met several times and, though we are still experimenting and finding our feet, we now have the aim of organising this for the first Sunday of every month. It is discussion based, with lots of cake and upbeat music.

Parallel to this, Annie called a meeting in early May, one of the main purposes of which was (for her) to find ways of bringing the children she meets into church – finding worship that works for nonchurch families. It was proposed that one **morning** service a month was changed to accommodate a different style of worship: this has evolved to be the **3rd Sunday**. There will be two alternating styles:

- t 'Cafe Church' designed for teenagers+, with more emphasis on modern music and a relaxed service around tables in church with plenty of tea and cakes.
- * 'Messy Church' activities set out and organised outside the church itself (i.e. in Rooms 1-4 and garden) to which <u>all</u> church members regardless of age would be able to come and participate. Those who chose to remain in church would have a standard, traditional service. This is an even newer style of worship to us and so would be experimental, but has worked successfully elsewhere (John in Swansea, Dialstone Lane, Dave Holmes' father's church).

The net effect of this would be **one modern style worship service in the church sanctuary every two months**. It was thought that this might be manageable by most church members.

We cannot please everyone with worship styles (music, prayers, sermon, noise or craft) every week. One of the blessings of Methodism is its variety, and we thrive on flexibility and change. And if we are to be a growing church – a church with a plan for mission rather than an end-of-life plan – we must offer options that will appeal to new generations: to different age groups and cultural needs. This is a step in that direction.

dark and frightening things that are often the focus of this season.



ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING REPORT

During the morning service on the 30th July, we held our Annual Church Meeting, the occasion when we review what we have done over the past year, and look forward to the year ahead with all its challenges. It's an occasion for everyone to listen to reports from the various groups within the life of the church, and to elect various members of the Church Council.

Finding a suitable time for such a meeting, towards the end of the church year is a challenge. However, holding it within the main act of worship of the day seems wholly appropriate. It's God's work that we are about, and dealing with the business of the Church within worship enables us to offer our successes, our failures, our plans and our visions to God, and to give thanks for all the good things that have happened during the year. We can also pray as a church family that our work and our mission will be blessed by God, and be fruitful.

We had reports from the worship group, the pastoral committee and the stewards. There were reports on all aspects of our work with children and young people – Young Church, toddlers and preschool. Annie, our Children and Families worker told us of all the work that she has been doing since she joined us, including work in local primary schools. We were reminded of the importance of ensuring that our church is a safe place for children and vulnerable adults. And there were the mundane matters of finance and property – a reminder of the need to review our giving and the hard work put in by all who help maintain the bricks and mortar of God's house.

We remembered those members and adherents who had died since the last Annual Church meeting - Geoffrey Sharp, John Deighton, Elsie Faulkner, Margaret Barber, Lily Blocksidge, Irma Bates, Norma Battle, Hilda Hallworth and Ken Coombs.

There was a review of what we had done during the past year. Rev. John reported on many of the things that have taken place or happened, apart from 'Holy Habits'. The weekly Tuesday prayer group, who also meet once a month at the Kingfisher. There was a prayer day earlier in the year and many people participated in the "31+ things to do" prayer cycle.

There have been film nights and discussion on the films, the Craft Fair, the Charity Market, Theatre trips, and the provision of refreshments on Remembrance Sunday. We held a worship event with a bonfire; we became a 'Toilet Twinning Town'. We held Charity collections, and coffee mornings for Green Close. There were board games days and 'Search for a Star' in the shops at Christmas.

Our new Children and Families worker, Annie Truman, began working with us early in the New Year. Easter angels appeared in Park Lane. There were family fun days, we worked in pre-school, and participated in school assemblies. Dads were allowed freedom with 'Who let the Dads out'.

Our presence on Social Media was developed. Groups met for craft, and book reading and discussion. Ladies' Fellowship met regularly. We hosted the District Synod, held Safeguarding courses, and various house groups met. Hilary Parry carried out a faithful ministry ensuring that those residents of Parklands, who wished to and were able, could attend the 10.30am service on Sunday mornings.

We have done an awful lot as a family of faith.

The year ahead will be one of challenge. We will be subject to the stationing process, to find a replacement for Rev.John when he leaves us in July. We may have to face the prospect of being without a minister for a while. We need to consider new ways of being 'church' to be relevant to future generations.

On 31st August Chris Hawkyard retired from the post of chief steward. Thanks Chris for all you have done during your term of office. Marie Moncaster has agreed to serve as a steward from 1st 20

September. Margaret Martin, Christine Ding and Alan Rashleigh stood down from Church Council and Theo Eves, Hilary Parry and Jean Drinkwater were re-elected as representatives to the Council from the membership.

The service finished with us singing "We are people on a journey". A new leg of that journey is just beginning.

The three boys were all the same age, which often happens with mice, and had developed into such good runners that they entered all the local races, invariably beating the local field mice throughout the three acres.


One day they were coming home from a fancy dress party where they had won first prize dressed as the three mouseketeers with elaborate hats and riding coats.
