So, while you all beaver away working it out here are a few of the details. I will be going to a circuit of three ministers and 11 churches. I will look after three of those churches, each one being distinct in its location, context and culture. The main one has a membership of 133 and is diverse in age, ethnicity, nationality and culture with people from 16 different nationalities attending including a small Ghanaian fellowship. My second church has a membership of 20 families and meets every other week in a local primary school and uses models developed by the Fresh Expressions movement and Messy Church. My third church is semi-rural and alternates its worship every week with its local Anglican church. Their combined aim is to strengthen the Christian presence within the local village community

I will also have the chance to work alongside a 'Venture FX Pioneer', in his ground-breaking exploration of what it means to be disciples of Jesus with communities of people outside the traditional church model. This will involve supporting his work at a 'church' which is based around an allotment. And no, before anyone asks, I don't want a spade as a leaving present!

STATIONING UPDATE

After completion of the third round of stationing in early January, the Hazel Grove and Poynton circuit was unfortunately once again not matched with a prospective minister. As I have stated before this was primarily due to an imbalance of numbers, the fact that the District had 5 spots to fill, our falling into a 'need to fill' position and also a reluctance by some ministers to 'move north'.

This means that it is highly likely that from Sept 2018, when Rev Amanda Boon retires and Rev John moves to pastures new, the only full-time minister in the circuit with be Rev John Payne.

The Chair of District Andrew Lunn is in the process of arranging support for the circuit and some of the other churches are in the process of investigating the possibility of employing pastoral/family workers etc.

What this means is that for a period of 12 months there will be an added responsibility on the laity of the church. Thankfully, the Methodist Church is by and large one in which the laity normally have the greatest involvement and responsibility of any major denomination.

It will mean people putting their hands up to offer to help. This will be the case especially with regards the stewardship/leadership of the church and the area of pastoral visitors where we are currently short of active people even before Rev John goes.

It you feel the Holy Spirit is calling you to offer your services to the life of the church and Circuit, then please get in touch with Rev John as soon as possible.

'Ordinary Miracles' Men, Meals and Meeting Jesus In Unexpected Places by Chris Lane. Published by Instant Apostle £8.99

If you want to know more about the area in Salford where our twin church Emmanuel Is situated (the Langworthy Estate) then this is the book for you. It tells the story of an Eden Project (The Message Trust), a Church plant (Langworthy Community Church) and a Life Centre for young people set up on the estate.

It is a story of stickability (eighteen years) when it would have been easy to run away in the face of crime such as housebreaking, arson, stone throwing etc. Chris Lane says that he has long admired the Anglican Church for its vision of having a church in every part of the country.

The book also mentions the Eden Bus which goes near Salford precinct and encourages youngsters to play together, instead of causing damage and mayhem, which is what happened big time prior to its arrival. The police are so delighted with the success of the bus and the fact that crime has dropped dramatically since it started that they have helped to fund the project.

Food is a feature in this book and reaching the community with the love of Jesus began round a table, when the community wing of the local primary school was hired for a meal to celebrate Easter.

Communal meals were started by Jesus but did not last. They were banned by Augustine in the fourth century, by which time they had long become detached from the Sacrament and had largely lost their purpose. Jesus' meal table was filled with the most unlikely people.

In Langworthy, eating together has been central and meeting as church around a table has made and deepened friendships. As in Jesus' meals there has been a motley collection of people all on a messy journey of faith together, hungry for Jesus and praying to meet him.

One story in the book amazed me – the story of 'Britain in Bloom' – in Langworthy! A local lady suggested entering. A team was formed and funding secured for thousands of hanging baskets – one for every home on the estate plus large planters – to be attached to fences on the main roads and filled with flowers. Shopkeepers on both sides of Langworthy Road got on board and did their bit and local schoolchildren joined in too.

Amazingly the flowers and decorations stayed in place, while amid the rubbish and boarded up properties, the judges inspected. Against all odds Langworthy were awarded first prize in the North West in its category! This was a great encouragement to the people on the estate.

I liked especially the chapter called 'A week in Langworthy' in which are the details of all that is going on in the area with some wonderful stories there.

I hope I haven't given the impression that everything in Langworthy is wonderful every day. This is a 'warts and all' story and there are dark and desperate situations mentioned, but the point is made that if we want to experience the power of Christ we must be willing to suffer too as stated in Philippians 3.10.

Many lessons have been learned including the need to keep plodding on. Of course, it goes without saying that prayer underpins everything that happens. The churches in Salford work together, having regular worship and prayer gatherings, taking part in Party in the Park etc. as well as Langworthy Community Church having twice

weekly morning prayers and small groups for Bible teaching and prayer.

I highly recommend this exciting read but be warned it is one of those 'impossible to put down' books.

"ENGAGING THE WORD" (Biblical Literacy and Christian Discipleship) By Peter M Phillips. Published by The Bible Reading Fellowship

To save readers from becoming stressed by trying to understand the sub-title, Peter has very helpfully opened his Introduction with the words, "This book is about the relationship between the reading of the Bible and following Jesus".

Later he asks the question, "Can we be better Christians by engaging more with the Bible?" The fundamental purpose of the Bible is surely to inspire mere mortals to aspire to be more like our Saviour and to follow in his footsteps. The problem comes with many being unfamiliar with Biblical language, as it is couched in terms not in everyday use. Hence the purpose of the book is to help the reader to understand what the Bible is really about, and how we should use it.

The book is a call to action, it looks at the way that by engaging the Bible our understanding of our journey through the Christian life will be transformed.

There are similar books which seek to achieve the same objectives, mainly by exhorting their readers to follow the instructions laid down in the Bible. This one is different, and to some may seem to be controversial, in that it argues that the Bible is not a rule book or instruction manual, but a guide to enable followers to 'crank up' their own engines of Christian discipleship, with a few additives.

It explores Biblical literacy (engagement with the Word of God) and discipleship (engagement with the world) – this is not surprising as Peter was a tutor at Cliff College, and among his other 'duties' was

encouraging students to engage with the world. He uses examples of the writings of Augustine, Aldred and Erasmus, as well as the way in which mystery plays have helped people understand Biblical stories. Being a Methodist, it would be remiss of Peter not to include passages written by John Wesley to interpret the Bible as an aid to discipleship.

Also explored is what it means to engage with the Word of God in a world in which contemporary communication is focussed on digital means.

This is a well-written, readable book, which provides practical advice to those reading the Bible who want to put what they have read to practical use in the world. It is in itself an 'Engaging Book', and very worthwhile reading.

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 28

'I, the Lord of sea and sky' (Here I am, Lord). Words by Daniel L. Schutte 1947-

Coming out of the clouds a helicopter emerges over the North Sea as it returns successfully from another rescue mission. For a Christian seaman, a mountaineer, or a pilot in danger out at sea, there are times when the words of this hymn must have a special meaning.

I remember a 'Songs of Praise' programme from Lossiemouth, Scotland when we saw the presenter Diane-Louise Jordan being winched up to a rescue helicopter. It was a dramatic prelude to the hymn. An R.A.F. corporal sang the opening verse as a solo and then the congregation joined in with the chorus 'Here I am Lord.' This was just a practice rescue but often it is a matter of life and death.

Schutte is a Roman Catholic and much of his inspiration comes from many years as a parish musical director. He is composer in residence at the University of San Francisco. He wrote it to lead people into prayer and for general participation.

The story of Nathaniel is an unusual subject for a painting. Here, he is lying under a fig tree, prior to his calling by Philip, apparently naked.

Cazalet suggests Nathaniel knew that Jesus had seen him in his entirety. The modelling of the figure, which is an unrealistic deep reddy-brown, is very sculptural. The ground is sketched in, with the dappled shadow of the fig tree. The tree is botanically inaccurate but fits the artist's purpose to portray it as an image of fruitfulness and consistency.

Cazalet has tried to capture the nub of the story, particularly Nathaniel's bizarre response to Jesus' comment, and to suggest something unusual about the narrative.

The simplicity of the composition captures the simplicity of the story, the 'metaphysical moment when every part of Nathaniel was "seen" by Christ'.



LET'S TALK ABOUT MESSY CHURCH

Happy New Year to all at Poynton Methodist Church and thank you all for your support during 2017!

Throughout last year we have been establishing a 'Messy Church', which gets together once every school holiday, and it has struck me that many of you may not have a clue as to what goes on at these mysterious meetings.

So here is a brief Messy scenario. To begin with it is messy! Some of the crafts are messy and there is very little structure during the first part of the morning. The charge per family is £2.00 and everyone is welcomed at the door and given some idea as to the format and the content of the session. As people arrive they are directed towards craft tables/ activities, but they are free to choose just to chill with a cup of coffee; the only thing we ask is that they take responsibility for the children that they have brought at all times. (This needs some gentle reiteration throughout the morning!) We tend to attract those with younger children and have in the past specified its particular suitability for the under eights.

After about an hour (or sooner if the natives begin to get restless) we stop for a brief talk/story, a song and a prayer before getting together for a snack. And there we have it. Messy in a nutshell!

I just want to write a little about the Messy approach.

- It is nationwide and has proved very successful at getting young families to engage with church. As it takes a specific format it means that if people are new to an area and have attended Messy church in the past they have some idea what they are coming to. Conversely if we want to invite people to come we know what we are inviting them to.
- The aim is to provide an alternative style of church and build up a Messy congregation. This is best done on a day other than a Sunday, although I have known a Sunday Messy church to work. It

is not necessarily the case that attendees will start to come to an ordinary Sunday service but as far as I am concerned the closer the links between the two congregations the better. Some Messy churches have gone on to have their own communion services (led by an ordained minister of course) and baptisms.

- Messy Church has tended to attract those who are on the 'messy margins' rather than the completely unchurched. It is for all regardless of age/race/ gender etc.
- There should always be a chance for everyone to eat together in some way, shape or form. A proper meal is the ideal and the suggestion is that the whole of messy church including the meal should be free. (Obviously if we decided to go down this route we would have to consider how MC could be funded).

To finish I am pleased with the way this initiative is going here at PMC but would like to see it develop further. My gifts tend to be with the little ones, so no matter how hard I try, it seems to be families with younger children that we attract. If anyone has talents which would help to include the adults and older children a little more in the crafts/activities do please come and say. Any suggestions/help would be gratefully received!

There is huge scope here for us to draw alongside young families especially when we eat together. (Remember Holy Habits.) Maybe when we provide snacks/a meal we could be more intentional about sitting alongside and eating with those who would not normally come to our church worship. (I am talking to myself here as I sometimes see this as an opportunity to start clearing things away!)

Do please support us in whatever way you can and help to make Messy Poynton Methodist Church a truly Christian community.

If you use any electrical appliances in the Church premises, these need to be tested. This includes any appliance you may own personally, viz. computers etc. If you attend Church at the above time this can be carried out at a cost (personal items) of £1.00.

If you are a member of a group within the Church and you have items tucked away, please make them available on the day. They can be left in the Church office, if clearly marked, and they will be tested.

Any monies can be left with the items in an envelope, if not Church property. These tests are relevant to Health and Safety and additionally there are obvious insurance implications. (Ring Derek Garner if you wish further information).

QUINQUENNIAL INSPECTION

This is the 5-year inspection/survey of all PMC Church premises, covering a wide range of issues connected with the fabric of the Church such as its internal and external condition; for example, the building/roof/ heating/grounds/systems/general condition etc. This is a compulsory Methodist Church requirement for all Churches and PMC was due in December 2017. The first part of the inspection, a


physical survey took place last December and there will probably be follow up visits as well in the near future. At the end of the process PMC will receive a report with recommendations and observations for potential further action.

There will be no SOMS sessions during Lent to allow the various churches to run their own study courses.


The next SOMS sessions will take place straight after Easter and will look at the topic of 'Roles and Relationships'. The dates for these sessions are...
