MUMBLINGS FROM THE MANSE

March 2018

So, it is a tricky task to write something about Lent for a magazine that will only appear two weeks into that six-week journey; and also, to encourage people to think about the theme we are currently running. (The theme of course, as you all know, is about 'Finding a Voice', or perhaps to be more accurate, hearing God's voice and then responding by using your voice to proclaim the good news.)

Right of the start of his ministry, during his baptism by John in the River Jordon, Jesus hears God's voice. Well in Mark's account he does. In fact, the words "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased," seem to indicate that it is only Jesus who hears it.

A different tale is told by Matthew who has a far more open declaration: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased," perhaps implying a wider listening audience. What is not in dispute is the fact that this voice acknowledges the close relationship between Jesus and God and also that the voice affirms Jesus. (It does not indicate his messiah-ship or divinity.)

Perhaps it is the echo of this voice that provides Jesus with the hidden strength to resist the temptations he faces in the wilderness. Maybe it is the memory of this voice that allows Jesus to find the voice to dismiss the lures of the Devil by quoting words of scripture. And perhaps it is the recollection of that voice at the River Jordan, which empowers Jesus to verbalise the manifesto of his ministry, when he paraphrases the voice of the prophet Isaiah hundreds of years earlier when he declares in his home town synagogue: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

The six weeks of Lent are for many a time of denial, a time when things are given up. The opposite can also be true; Lent can be a time to take things up. Above all else, it is hopefully a time of transformation, changing us from the people and families of faith we are, into the people God's wants us to become.

Last year, (yes, I know it's a long way to cast your minds back) we engaged in 40 acts of discipleship during Lent. This involved ideas such as reading the gospels; collecting loose change and donating it to a charity; getting fitter; buying Fair-trade; signing up to help out at church or in the community; inviting someone for a meal; reconnecting with family and friends; offering a safe space to someone in distress; visiting someone trapped inside their own home; doing something for someone who is sick; donating food to a food bank; easing someone's spiritual thirst by introducing Jesus, faith or the church into a conversation; de-cluttering your wardrobe and taking any unwanted clothes to a homeless shelter; fasting for a day or surviving on £5 for 5 days; buying a Big Issue seller lunch; picking up litter; making a phone call and telling someone that you love them; joining a study group; just stopping moaning and complaining; putting away any social media for a day; getting the right attitude by 'being' the beatitudes; giving away bars of chocolate to strangers; developing the fruit of the sprit (love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol); spending time in silence; attending a worship service you wouldn't normally go to; paying someone a compliment; sharing a skill; writing something for your church or circuit magazine. A whole gamut of things that seem far too good to just do once.

So perhaps this year as you undertake one, several or all of those activities, how is God speaking to you through those challenges? In what is God saying or calling you to become more involved?

And by responding to God's voice, how do your actions, words and simply 'being', help to proclaim the good news to friend and stranger alike? Who knows, you and those with whom you come into contact might just end up being transformed by the whole experience. After all, isn't that what Lent is really all about?

STATIONING

Many of you will be aware that during the first 3 rounds of Stationing the Hazel Grove and Poynton Circuit was not matched with any prospective minister. This was due in the main to the imbalance in numbers between the number of ministers available and positions that needed filling.

Our Chair of District, Dr Rev Andrew Lunn, has been working hard to find a suitable solution to the situation that will arise from Sept 2018 when Rev Amanda Boon retires and Rev John moves to his new appointment.

On Saturday 17th February a potential candidate came to visit the Circuit and in particular Poynton, Green Close and Dialstone Lane churches. She spent most of the day in the circuit and was met by representatives from each church as well as members of the Circuit Leadership Team. After the visit had been concluded an offer was made by the Circuit and that offer was accepted.

Our appointee is Rev Ros Watson, currently a minister in the Altrincham Circuit. She will have pastoral charge of Poynton, Green Close and shared charge of Dialstone Lane alongside Rev John Payne

The arrangement has been made within the Manchester and Stockport District and will involve her leaving her current appointment 6 months early. This means that she will not be starting here until **March 2019** i.e. we will have a period of 6 months without a minister. Suitable steps are being put into place to provide cover during that time

The news was announced in both Circuits at the same time. We express our thanks especially to Dr Rev Andrew Lunn for all his hard work in bringing this match about, to both Circuit Leadership Teams and those who met Ros and her husband during their visit and also to the current Superintendent of the Altrincham Circuit, Rev Janet Aspey as we all prepare for an unexpected six month's period of transition from March 2019. We continue to hold all those involved in this process in our thoughts and prayers.

"Finishing our Course with Joy" Ageing with Hope by J I Packer, published by IVP at £6.99.

J I Packer, now in his 80s, is the author of over 40 books and served as General Editor of the English Standard Version Bible and the Theological Editor of the ESV Study Bible.

One thing I particularly like about this book is the large, clear print. It is an easy book to read and challenges us to please God rather than ourselves with our eyes on the 'Hope of Glory'.

The readers J I Packer is addressing are Christian seniors at or near his own age. As we age, we all face temptations from three sources: the world, the flesh and the devil. We need to be aware of these as we look at the path for godly ageing.

There are temptations to conform to what is already taking place and just go with the flow, following the path that the secular community and the church to which we belong is on already. There can be a tendency sometimes, if we have a very busy stressful job, to think that when we retire we can take it easy, Billy Graham said the word 'retire' is not in his Bible.

In this book, the point is made that many countries have drifted away from the Christian faith and so have lost touch with Christian hope. This is a huge loss because we have the Hope of Glory. The Roman Empire was a world that, like our own today, seemed to lack any hope, which explains why so many listened to the Christian Message.

Paul's spirit was not broken by the state of his body and as we age, we must not allow our bodies to break us. We must do the best we can with what we have and press on with hope, enabling us to finish our lives with joy and glorify Jesus, no matter how old we are.

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 29

'What a friend we have in Jesus' Words by Joseph Scriven (1819-86) Tune Converse, by Charles Converse (1832-1918).

The hymn was first published in the Sankey Hymn Book. The tune Converse can be made to fit all sorts of hymns: - 'Blessed Assurance, Jesus is mine' for example, a great Moody and Sankey favourite.

There cannot be many hymns intended for the writer's mother that turn up in Hymn books all over the world. Ira Sankey said that Joseph Scriven wrote the words for his mother in 1855 at a time when she was feeling extremely upset. Apparently, he summed up his verses for her with the words. 'Pray without ceasing.'

No one knows what had upset her but the tragedy that later struck her son is well known. Not long before their wedding the girl who was the love of his life was drowned, and he never got over it and later emigrated from his native Ireland to Canada.

It is the sort of hymn that was sung in air raid shelters during the Second World War blitz, and was sung often by the Salvation Army on street corners in happier days. Thora Hird wrote how this hymn had helped her in times of loneliness and despair. She said she always sang it in her garden and on one occasion she looked up to see a row of curious cows looking at her over the fence obviously enjoying it too.

A BBC Songs of Praise book from which I gained much of my background for this hymn, points out that at Victorian Revivalist Meetings it must have sounded intriguing. Hymns were given out two lines at a time, since many of the people could not read. The whole verse was read to begin with, and gave the impression that as 5,000 or 6,000 voices sang it was strangely gentle as though all were wrapped in thought.

When visiting care homes in the 1980s John Bell, a hymn writer, realised that all too quickly old people ran out of breath and so used the tune 'Scarlet Ribbons'. This was a popular song about a father and daughter made famous by Harry Belafonte in the 1950s.

This suited the original purpose of the hymn. The late Harry Secombe sang 'What a friend we have in Jesus' to the tune 'Scarlet Ribbons' in a programme in the 1980s.

References: Matthew 11.28 - Jesus' gracious invitation to 'Come to Me', for all who are weary and heavy burdened with the troubles of life and the sins of their own human nature. By coming to Jesus, we receive help and peace and the presence of the Holy Spirit to lead us through.

ALZHEIMER'S SUPPORT - Sew Easy Kits

Ivy Kilshaw was my next door neighbour for 26 years. She died last year having been a resident at Woodlands. I received a Christmas card from one of her daughters, who lives in Halifax. In it she told me how she is raising money for the Alzheimer's Society. She wrote, "After losing Mum last year I decided I wanted to do something to raise awareness of Dementia, and raise money to fund research and support sufferers and their families as they live with the disease on a daily basis."

Alyson has so far made 1,700 Sewing Kits selling at £! each. To date she has raised nearly £1,400. She says her long term target is a million pounds! Each kit contains a needle threader, a large-eyed needle, some cotton and a safety pin.

I have purchased 20 kits so far, and as instructed by Alyson, have sent a cheque to the Alzheimer's Society, at their York address. I hope to sell them. If you would like to buy, please let me know.

If I can sell my twenty, I can give anyone else who wants to support this scheme and sell some, the address details required.

Nine years ago, my dear wife Marianne, after 62 years of marriage died of Alzheimer's, so I have a very personal interest in advertising this scheme

In 1968, the Ford car factory in Dagenham was one of the largest

single private employers in the United Kingdom.

In addition to the thousands of male employees, there are also 187 underpaid women machinists who primarily assemble the car seat upholstery in poor working conditions. Dissatisfied, the women, represented by the shop steward and Rita O'Grady, work with union rep Albert Passingham for a better deal.

However, Rita learns that there is a larger issue in this dispute considering that women are paid an appalling fraction of the men's wages for the same work across the board on the sole basis of their sex. Refusing to tolerate this inequality any longer, O'Grady leads a strike by her fellow machinists for equal pay for equal work.

What follows would test the patience of all involved in a grinding labour and political struggle that would ultimately advance the cause of women's rights around the world.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

Our religious freedoms are under threat.

I have just received information and a petition from a well-known Charity (https://barnabasfund.org/en) who provide hope and aid for the persecuted church.

The church in the UK is now being persecuted and freedom of religion and other historic freedoms such as freedom of speech, freedom of the press and academic freedom are all increasingly under threat.

There are seven important aspects of freedom of religion which have become central to our national identity and values which needed to be specifically protected:

- 1. Freedom to read the Bible in public (achieved 1537)
- 2. Freedom to interpret the Bible without government interference (achieved 1559)
- 3. Freedom of worship (achieved 1689)
- 4. Freedom to choose, or change your faith or belief (achieved 1689)
- 5. Freedom to preach and try to convince others of the truth of your beliefs (achieved 1812)
- 6. Freedom to build churches and other places of worship (achieved 1812)
- 7. Freedom from being required to affirm a particular world view or set of beliefs in order to hold a public-sector job or stand for election, work in professions such as teaching and law, or study at university (achieved by the repeal of various Test Acts between 1719 and 1888)

As mentioned earlier, I have a petition. Please see me and ask to sign it. It has to be returned by 30th September. You may also wish to help to get copies of the petition signed. This is not a demand for special rights for Christians, but the petition arises out of a concern that the space for religious freedom is shrinking as an increasingly intolerant secularism takes hold. If you do sign, you will be calling upon the

British Government to make a new law to enshrine fully and permanently the religious freedoms we have gained in the UK over the past five centuries.

Above all, please also pray about the current situation.
