Last year, all office holders in the church were asked to produce a job description. Because I usually do as I am asked (more frequently than I do as I am told) I set to work.

The section that is headed 'Purpose of job' reads as follows:

Within the context of the Church Mission Statement printed on the inside front cover of each edition,

- to produce for the church community and beyond information relating to services and events taking place at Poynton and Green Close Methodist Churches and significant events in the wider Poynton and Hazel Grove Circuit

Alongside these thanks, comes a word of encouragement to please continue to provide me with more of the same (or different!) so that our purpose may continue to be achieved.





'Good Night, God' by David C. Cook. Published by the author. £9.28.

The book starts with hope and a suggestion to look at the sky when it is clear at night. God showed Abraham the stars and asked him to count them. He was giving him hope that the promise He had made to him that he would have a son, was coming. The stars are a picture of hope for us too, just as they

were for Abraham.

The idea behind the book is to help you end your day with God. There are short, encouraging reflections and each one ends with a verse (or sometimes, two) of inspiring scripture.

'Goodnight, God' is just the way to switch off from all the stresses and strains of the day – the demands of work, family, friends etc. and discover calm rest in God as you prepare for sleep.

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 31

`And can it be' HP 216; MP 33 Charles Wesley

On 24th May 1738, the Princess of Wales gave birth to a son. That baby was destined to be King George III.

On the same day, a young curate attended a service in the new St. Paul's Cathedral, rebuilt after the Great Fire of London in 1666 reduced it to ashes. There, he heard the choir sing Psalm 130,

beginning with the solo. "Out of the deep have I called unto thee O Lord; O Lord, hear my voice."

But as John Wesley, that same curate records, what followed at the Bible Meeting 'at a quarter to nine that same evening, was far more mysterious than the sound of the choir earlier in the great cathedral. Recalling the words of the psalm he felt `strangely warmed.' It was a moment of personal conversion that was to influence the course of Christianity around the world.

Even more so because his younger brother, Charles, also a priest in the Church of England had experienced a similar feeling of 'strange warmth', which had led to his own conversion only three days earlier. As a result, a small group of Christians called the `Holy Club' became the founding fathers of the Methodist movement.

A year after Charles' conversion "And can it be" was published. It began as a poem called 'Free Grace' and the verses describe his own conversion experience.

References:

Verse 1 lines 1&2: Matthew 26.28. Lines3-6: Romans 5.6-8

Verse 2 lines 3-6: 1Peter 1.12

Verse 3 lines 1-4: Philippians 2.5-8

Verse 4 Acts 12.7, Acts 16.23-32: It is the lines in verse 4 that for many people are so important in a personal conversion, and Charles saw his own experience of being 'strangely warmed' as reminiscent of the story in Acts.

Verse 5 line 1: Romans 8.1

Theo opens the Heritage Garden

The belated coming of Spring weather encouraged a large crowd to gather on Saturday 14th April to celebrate the official opening of the Heritage Garden. The area between the Library and Civic Hall on one side and Priorslegh Medical centre on the other has been transformed into a beautiful garden featuring raised beds, planters, insect house, bird box and a number of wall mounted silhouettes that celebrate Poynton's rich heritage.

Theo Eaves was commissioned to give the opening speech which he did with his usual panache. He included mention of an illustration made 2,000 years ago by Jesus about wild flowers outshining Solomon in all his glory and added anecdotes from his own large collection. Accompanied by the Mayor, Cllr Mrs Sara -Jane Gilmore he then cut the ribbon and declared the garden open. Do take a look at it.

On 12th April, Theo was in Lincoln alongside about 300 other survivors of Bomber Command and their relatives and friends from all over the world for the opening of The International Bomber Command Centre. The memorial commemorating all

their colleagues who gave their lives during World War II takes the form of a **Spire** surrounded by **The Walls of Names.**

The Spire is now recognised as the UK's tallest war memorial. It was awarded the 2016 Structural Steel Design Award.

The Walls of Names remember almost 58,000 men and women who lost their lives serving or supporting Bomber Command during WW II. The Walls of Names surround the Memorial Spire in a series of circles framing the view of the City and the Cathedral. There are 270 individual panels. Each one is formed from engraved sheets of Corten Weathering Steel.

Every life lost in Bomber Command was equal in sacrifice and as a result the walls do not recognise rank or medals awarded.

At the ribbon cutting, the 300 survivors all held the long ribbon which snaked from row to row and having made their cut at the same time, each person was left holding a length of the ribbon which they retained as a keepsake.

A PLACE FOR THE PULPIT

Recently the pulpit has moved! It seems the reasons for this were that it blocked the line of sight from the seats near the fire door to the screen, and to ensure it was not in the same area as the young children in Church, who found it a space they liked to explore. Somewhat surprisingly, both the area set aside for our youngsters and the pulpit finished up again in close proximity to one another.

Answers to enquiries as to the future location of the pulpit have been rather vague. It seems no decision has yet been made.

There are ideas that the pulpit takes up too much space, is not used by preachers and could be described as surplus to requirements. It is true that it is not used very often, but perhaps that may be partly because it has not been easily accessible and its floor is used for storage. (Originally the pulpit was part of the worship area.)

Please, as well as these issues, can consideration be given to the fact that the pulpit, communion table and font represent the Word and Sacraments we hold dear. They confirm that we are in a "special place" as we enter Church.

A number of Members have shared their concerns, and we ask that this matter can be prayerfully considered with open discussion, perhaps at the Church General Meeting on 8th July, before any decisions are made about the future location of the pulpit.

Come along and join Alvin on his picturesque and at times deeply spiritual odyssey to reconcile with his lost brother.



SEMI-CIRCUIT WALK SATURDAY 12th MAY or

BOOTS ARE MADE FOR WALKING PART II Poynton – Green Close – Windlehurst – Poynton

There are three stages to the walk:

Leaving Poynton Methodist Church at 9.00am, the first stage up to Green Close Methodist Church is 4.6km with an estimated time of 1hr 22mins. Coffee will be served from 10.30am till 11.00am. If anyone does not want to walk but wishes to join us for fellowship at Green Close PLEASE feel to do so.

The second stage is from Green Close to Windlehurst. There will be two possible routes, the first heading up via Lyme Park which will be 5.9km and take an estimated 1hr 35mins. A flatter, shorter, alternative walk along the Macclesfield Canal is possible. A light lunch of rolls etc. will be available at Windlehurst from 12.30pm until 2.00pm. If anyone does not want to walk but wishes to join us for lunch and fellowship at Windlehurst, PLEASE feel free to do so. Can you please let Rev. PROPERTY UPDATE

- * Repairs to light over security gate ongoing.

QUINGENNIAL INSPECTION

This was carried out by outside surveyors between December 2017 and April 2018 for PMC. We have now received the report which is mainly satisfactory. There are some issues for attention in the future which will be addressed 'progressively'.

FIRE/ASBESTOS MANAGEMENT

A report was presented to the last Church Council meeting in February 2018 on the above matters which was accepted and introduced into the Minutes. More detail is available via the Church Office if required. The conclusion is: 'we are safe', but it is an issue for constant monitoring.

HALL LIGHTING

The original lighting fitted when the hall was first built is now getting old and inefficient. It is intended to replace all the old fluorescent twin units with LED strip lights which are more efficient and economical at some point in 2018.

PLASTICS/ENVIRONMENT/WASTE

The church currently has to pay for two large wheelie bins to deal with general waste and cardboard/paper. This is NOT catered for within the commercial council tax paid by the Church. It would not be cost effective to pay also for a separate bin for waste plastics. A small purple bin has been placed in the church kitchen for plastics. By all means use it. However, this is not a case of 'dump the plastic' and someone else will sort it out. ALL are encouraged to take home any waste plastics and use your own grey bins. ALSO, if you can help

by taking some of the used plastics in the purple bin, this would be a great help. Many may not even half fill a home grey bin, so think if you can help. As you are all aware, this has now become a major issue; we can also keep church costs down by not putting these items in the general waste bin, making sure they go to the correct re cycling facility.



THE METHODIST CHURCH - 1



The Methodist Church is still organised in a methodical way using many of the structures introduced by its founder, John Wesley. However, the Church is quite pragmatic, and is willing to make changes where they seem desirable.

Structures are there to enable decision making that takes account of all concerns and views within the Church. No one is given supreme authority - consultation is vital. At the same time, churches cannot simply arrange their own affairs, but have some shared disciplines and ways of working.

The Connexion

Methodists belong to local churches or ecumenical partnerships, but also feel part of a larger connected community, the Connexion.

This sense of being connected makes a difference to how the Methodist Church as a whole is structured. At its heart is an understanding of the Christian community as the 'body of Christ'.

Just as a human body contains different limbs and organs that depend on each other, so we should be close and caring enough to feel each other's pain and delight. We should put the good of the whole body before our own individual needs.

When ministers or deacons are ordained in the Methodist Church, they are also 'received into full Connexion.'

The promise of mutual support is a strength of Methodism. If you become a member of the Methodist Church, a pastoral visitor is responsible for visiting you and offering spiritual support, encouragement and challenge.

In the Methodist Church decisions are made as openly as possible, giving opportunities for all to contribute. It is important for all views to be heard and taken seriously, especially where Christians disagree.

Note

Included in the British Methodist Connexion are all the districts of Scotland, Wales and England, along with the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands and Shetland.
