#### Dear friends

# HAZEL GROVE & POYNTON CIRCUIT MEETING

Our Circuit meeting keeps its members busy on our behalf to ensure that the Circuit is being run properly (that is, in accordance with the law of the land and the rules of the Methodist Church).

The technical work is done by its appointed officers – 16 of them – (like the Circuit Safeguarding Officer, the Circuit Treasurer, the Circuit Secretary, the Circuit Stewards and so on). The ordinary members of the Circuit Meeting – 22 of them – are elected by the Church Councils of the Local churches from among their own members.

The appointed officers are responsible in the first instance to the Circuit Meeting as a whole for the work they do.

There is always a lot to do to keep the Circuit running smoothly, things of which many in the local churches are completely unaware and sadly uninterested. Indeed, that goes too for the organisation of the local church itself – until something goes wrong!

This year is a particularly busy year for the officials and members of the Circuit Meeting of this Circuit. They are preparing for all the legal and organisational changes that have to be made to split the circuit into two parts. PMC and Green Close are moving into the Macclesfield Circuit and a new circuit will be formed comprising the churches of the existing Stockport Circuit, Windlehurst, Hazel Grove and Dialstone Lane. The new circuit will be called Stockport United.

Routine matters like making sure preachers are appointed for each of the services in the five churches and seeing to it that we fulfil our financial obligations will go on at the same time.

So when the Circuit Meeting met on 13<sup>th</sup> September, it dealt among other things with items like:

- Responsibilities of trusteeship and data protection
- Sale of Offerton Church (continuing)
- Working towards appointing a lay-worker at Dialstone Lane

- Canvassing the views of the Circuit Meetings and Church Councils of the Local Churches in each of the three Circuits involved.
- Appointment of a Circuit Safeguarding Officer (HG&P)
- Staffing considerations and appointments for three ministers including one superintendent to the enlarged Stockport Circuit for September 2019.
- Considerations of Finance
- Manses
- Local Preachers
- Green Close Management
- Methodist Women in Britain
- Action for Children
- Methodist Homes
- Circuit Safeguarding Policy

One of the above items, 'Staffing considerations and appointments...' is already well underway. It may come as a surprise to some to discover that the work involved in appointing a new minister can start about 18 months before the appointment takes effect. It involves a large body of work which is undertaken by a subcommittee of the Circuit Meeting called the Circuit Invitation Committee. There are 10 members of the committee in this instance, 3 ministerial and 7 lay.

It is unusual for a Circuit Invitation Committee to have to handle three appointments in the same year. A 15-page document has already been produced describing the characteristics of the churches to which each appointee will minister, details of the locality, type, location and description of the manses and a person specification for the vacancy.

Hopefully this article will provide some insight into the work of the Circuit Meeting. Although seemingly daunting, the burden is carried by a number of able people and we can all become skilled by serving an apprenticeship on a church committee and the Church Council.

# THE METHODIST CHURCH - 5

#### The Conference

The Methodist Conference meets annually in June or July.

It first met in 1744 under John Wesley, who gathered together his assistants (both ordained ministers and itinerant lay preachers) to confer together about 'what to teach, how to teach, and what to do, i.e. how to regulate our doctrine, discipline and practice.'

The contemporary Conference is a gathering of representatives from each Methodist district, along with some who have been elected by the Conference and some ex officio members and representatives of the Youth Assembly.

There is a mixture of lay people, ordained presbyters and deacons. Presbyters and deacons also have their own separate gatherings before the main, decision-making session.

The Conference is the body that agrees policy for the Methodist Church.

Business for the Conference to decide upon is prepared by the Methodist Council, an elected body that meets regularly. Memorials to Conference may be sent by districts ahead of time, and representatives to Conference may introduce Notices of Motion.

Further information is available about this year's Conference, for both elected representatives and the general public. You can listen to the debates and watch many videos of the proceedings online.



I love the cover with its four-storied Ark and I love the illustrations by Liz and Kate Pope and the rhyming re-telling of the Noah story.


This is a delightful book suitable for children aged 3 – 6.

# HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 35

"Be still, for the presence of the Lord" StF 20; MP 50.

David Evans's song, inspired by the words of the Bible, seems to touch people where they are. Just singing it seems to give us a sense of God's presence. Evans, a Hampshire-based piano teacher (1957-2013), said that the core message of his hymn came from a phrase in the Old Testament, "Then Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, 'Surely the Lord is in this place and I did not know it.'" (Genesis 28.16)

The hymn created a sacred moment for presenter Pam Rhodes and other members of the 'Songs of Praise' team. They were In St. Paul's Cathedral clearing away their equipment after a special live broadcast on the Sunday following the death of Diana, Princess of Wales. Somehow a microphone had been left connected. The sound of an unknown young woman gently singing Be Still helped the television team, together with thousands of others milling sadly in the Cathedral, to stop, be still and remember that 'the power of the Lord was moving in this place.'

It is all designed to discern whether the calling is right – both for me and for the Methodist Church. It might not be. After all, six months ago, when I began to put some balls in motion, I knew it was right; now I'm not so certain. It will be a rollercoaster ride.

How can you help? Pray! (Lots!!) Tell me - kindly - if I shouldn't be doing it. Offer to support Stephen, Matthew and Eleanor, who have to live with me throughout this process and face a change to their lives too.

Above all, smile and remind me that it is God's work we're all doing, whether or not we take a formal role within a church denomination. **Catharine Hughes**

## PROPERTY UPDATE

- The vertical upvc cover on the end wall of the church, which provides the utility services to the hall has been re secured.
- The church alarm systems and fire extinguishers were tested and certified by outside contractors on 22.8.18.
- A new smoke alarm has been fitted in the plant room.
- We believe we have now fixed the recurrent leak under the No.1.
   sink in the church kitchen.
- The third drawer in the filing cabinet in the office is defective. Do not use please.
- The hall lighting has been upgraded with 12 new LED twin lights. (Note the difference!)
- . A new LINCAT water boiler has been fitted in the church kitchen.

#### HALL LIGHTS

On two Saturdays in September a small team of 'willing' church volunteers, working at great height and personal risk (just a joke, in case any H&S officials read this) removed all the old six-foot fluorescent light fittings from the hall ceiling area. Twelve new LED (Light Emitting Diode) units were fitted in their place. They have improved massively the illumination of the hall space. They should also reduce running costs by a considerable amount and last longer. It has been recent evolved policy to replace any 'old' fitting requiring replacement, with an LED unit. (Note: Turning off unnecessary lights will always help to keep down costs).

#### LINCAT WATER BOILER

Many will be aware of the ups and downs of this much-used unit over the years. It finally expired and was replaced with a new one on 17.9.18. After liaising with LINCAT, it was commissioned on 20.9.18 after the rectification of a factory fault and is now in operation.

#### **ROOF LEAKS**

The roof is leaking in two places into the entrance area above the second light from the main door and near to the adjacent fire extinguisher. Please empty the buckets if you notice they are full.

## A HOUSE FOR HAITI

Our project was born on 24<sup>th</sup> June. The Church Council, acting as midwife, delivered a resounding approval to a proposal to raise money for Christian Aid's fund to build houses in Haiti.

We all know about the problems that Haiti has had in the recent past with earthquake, floods and landslides. Roads and flimsy houses have been damaged or swept away. A desperately poor community beyond our imagining has been living on the brink of despair for so long!

Christian Aid and other NGOs have been doing what they can, but all this work needs money and they are reliant on the generosity of people like us.

Our contribution may be a drop in the ocean, but the combined contribution of many communities like ours can make a difference. So we resolved to help by raising money to build a house – just one house! – and it will cost £7500 including training a builder who can go on to build other houses with other people's funds.

A small group appointed by the Church Council has set about the planning and organising of fund-raising events to bring in the money and also contact other organisations and local churches to enlist their financial contributions. We are pleased to acknowledge generous contributions from Michael Hart and Company, Green Close and Poynton Christian Fellowship. Our room hirers are also considering how they might help by arranging an event.

The group are well on their way to realising a full programme stretching from September to end of March 2019 that will achieve this aim. A concert on 9<sup>th</sup> March will mark our Church Anniversary.

The time period coincides with the gap between the two full-time ministries of Rev John Wiseman and Rev Ros Watson, during which

Rev Ian Coverdale and Rev Wesley Loane will stand in to look after our administrative and Pastoral needs.

This church family has reacted magnificently! There was an almost impulsive response of goodwill and practical giving from many and a secondary surge as the project was publicised, explained more fully and understood by many who were initially more cautious.

We had our first fund-raising Sunday lunch at the beginning of September and are already advertising our second, timed for the beginning of October. Our fund now stands at over £5,000!

The cardboard house representing our project is installed in church and we are adding and decorating sold bricks as the funds roll in. We look forward to handing the completed house to our Preschool at the end of the project.

Our next big event will be the visit of Springs Dance Company at the very beginning of December. They will present 'Journey of the Magi' and you will have already seen some publicity for the event. We need to emphasise that we have taken a risk that the show will be well supported if we are to make a profit for our House. The Dance Company is a professional company and wages have to be paid and the participants and their gear have to be transported and fed. We need a full house to pay our way and then add more bricks.

What we can guarantee is a wonderful evening's entertainment as well as a contribution to our Christmas preparation, if all the comments from previous audiences are anything to go by. So please do come along and enjoy the evening remembering that our ticket prices (which we think are fair for the quality of what we are presenting) is pitched to contribute to the fund.

Meanwhile, Mandy is planning Alternative Cards for the Charity Christmas Market and has enlisted the aid of four talented people to design them.

So thank you everybody for the zest with which you have reacted and answered the question, "And who is my neighbour?"


