In March the Rev Ros Watson will move to Poynton to lead us on the next stage of our journey and we shall officially welcome her on Sunday 17th March when she will take up her role with us. Ros is leaving her current church six months early to come to PMC and so we should include the Altrincham circuit in our thanks and prayers for they will be in a similar position to us. All of us at PMC extend a very warm welcome to Ros and Chris and their son Tim and hope that they will soon feel at home in Poynton, in the church, the village and the community. As it says in the song: "All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place."

We are excited by the new beginnings that will unfold and, no doubt, challenge us, but that will be a good thing – we need to keep moving forward. We have covered many literal miles over the years but we are still the traveling, wandering people of God – wanting to learn more.

As I write this, my first Minister's letter for the Herald, I do so sitting in my old manse amongst packed-up boxes of belongings and the, as yet, still not packed belongings! When you read it, I will be sitting in my new manse surrounded, no doubt, by some unpacked but many still packed-up belongings! I have lived in my current manse for five years and, knowing that sooner or later as is the way of Methodism I would be moving, I have deliberately kept things to a minimum...or so I thought! It is amazing the quantity of 'stuff' that you almost accidentally accumulate. I can't believe how many boxes have been filled, how much has been disposed of and yet how much there is still to pack!

The accumulation of 'stuff' knowingly and unknowingly and the stress and distraction that this can cause is not only a household phenomenon is it? The same can happen in our spiritual life can't it? We can become distracted by all sorts of church matters and politics and can lose sight of our first Love amongst it all. We can accumulate scars and hurts that we don't deal with prayerfully and carefully that come to dominate us and rob us of our joy. We can be so certain that we are right that we can miss the prompting of the Spirit. We can be so concerned with raising our own voice that we drown out the still, small voice of God. We can be so intent on our plans that we can forget that we are called to join in with what God is already doing in the world and the Church.

Just as packing up a house can give us pause to look at the 'stuff' and make decisions on which is good and which is not helpful or necessary, so Lent, beginning this month, is a gift, a season, when we are encouraged to pause and to examine our lives honestly under the gaze of our loving God. Not so that we can feel despair and beat ourselves up but so that we take time to ask God to prune us, cleanse us and help us by the Spirit to become all that we are called to be in Christ and to continue on our path of transformation into the very likeness of Christ. If we find that we have lost our way at all we can get back on the right path and once again make God's priorities our priorities, so that the work that we undertake together is the mission that God has for us to do at this time in this place.

I wonder how much 'stuff' you and I have accumulated since Lent last year? I wonder how freeing it would be for us to be rid of it? I wonder how much more effective agents of the Kingdom we could become if we do?

I wonder how much more joyous our Easter Day celebrations will be if we have made the most of the journey of Lent?

I am really looking forward to meeting you and joining with you all on this Lenten journey as we make space to hear God's voice and to be sensitive to the promptings of the Spirit so that we can discern God's call on our lives, individually and together, as we seek to be good and faithful servants of God.


PRAYER

'People in the Passion of Jesus' by Roger Ellsworth, published by Day One at £5.00.



This book looks at the Passion through the eyes of the people most closely associated with it. It is intended for two types of readers – non-Christians with the prayer that they will look at what Jesus did and come to Christ, and believers that they will be pointed to the Passion and spurred onwards in their Christian life.

At the start of the book, the term 'Passion', and where it comes from is explained. The first person in the book is Satan. He was definitely involved! The last person in the book is the most important person associated with the passion – Jesus himself.

Each of the thirteen chapters lists the appropriate Bible passage or passages at the start. These devotional studies are challenging and make you think.

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 39

'And did those feet in ancient time?'.

Words by William Blake. Music by G H Parry

In a corner of St. James's, Piccadilly, near Piccadilly Circus is a beautiful font carved by Grinling Gibbons who, after the great fire of 1666, worked with Christopher Wren to rebuild London's churches.

The shaft on which it rests is carved as the Tree of Life, and in relief is sculpted Adam and Eve, the Ark, and Christ's baptism. William Blake was baptised here

Blake grew up in a London of great contrasts, from elegant new terraces to the appalling squalor of the streets. From his window Blake could just see the Thames and the Surrey countryside. "That is heaven" he would say to his friends.

'Jerusalem' first appeared as a preface to a long poem called 'Milton'; Blake's attempt to correct "Paradise Lost". The hymn part of the poem was written about 1804, and explores the legend that Joseph of Arimathea, a secret disciple of Jesus, came to England with the Holy Grail; Joseph was associated with the 'countenance divine' which shone on the 'clouded hills' (the new thinkers of the 18th century coffee houses, who despised belief in the divine).

The 'dark satanic mills' seemingly describing Hell, were for Blake the new humanism, science and false religion of the day. The 'bow of burning gold ' (human intelligence') would uncover the ultimate truth, and all peoples would live for ever safe in God's love.

This poem, sometimes described as England's second national anthem became a popular song during the darkest days of the First World War. Strangely, it first appeared in July 1915 in a Scottish magazine and the last line was altered to "in Scotland's green and pleasant land".

THE LAST LEG (Candidating Part 4)

At Herald Deadline Day last month, I had no new news to share, but January has flown past and the wheels of Methodist Candidacy are still turning.

My psychological assessment was fine. I got to talk about Mum a bit (not something I often get the chance to do) and I noticed the raised eyebrow when I admitted to drinking the odd G&T. (I'm not a perfect Methodist!)

Then January brought the report on my portfolio and the District Candidates Committee. The former was good; the latter much more hair-raising. I had to prepare a 10-minute Creative Presentation on 'The Radical Nature of God's Grace'. (I used choc chip cookies to illustrate, in case you're interested.) The committee of 13 then asked follow-up questions; then I had two 'small group' interviews (3 interrogators in each); then back to the full group for more questioning. Three-and-a-half hours of being on my best behaviour...

Anyway, I got through with only one vote against. It was recommended that I spent some time with a Deacon so that I can better answer the questions about what the difference is between the different orders of ordained ministry, and why I am called to Presbyteral ministry. I therefore meet with Deacon Pru Cahill at Methodist Central Hall soon. On a more positive note, one lay member of the committee commended me for speaking in a language she understood, without highly complex theology and long Latin words.

Onwards and upwards... Next is the Connexional Candidates' Selection Committee. (We're Methodist: love committees...) I am writing this having just received the email invitation. I thought 3½ hours was bad: this is a full day! I'm to arrive at 3pm on Monday 25th March, and leave roughly the same time on Tuesday. And there is another presentation – this time only 5 minutes, entitled: 'Your undistinguishing regard was cast on Adam's fallen race' (Charles Wesley, StF 320) What does this verse mean in Britain today? (I might need some complex theology here! Your reflections on this are welcome.)

The final outcome is shared in early April.

This whole process has been a rollercoaster. I have gone from feeling utterly convinced this is the right route to take on one day, to being utterly convinced I should give it all up immediately the next. So far, the former has won out, but I gave myself a Quiet Day at Chapel in the Fields to allow some proper space for God to speak. In the afternoon I did their 'Psalm Walk': a short walk around the fields with Psalms to read at given spots. I shouted them to God and the four winds, and then was brought up short by the last verse of the final psalm of the walk:

I will lift up the cup of salvation and call upon the name of the Lord. (Psalm 116.11)

Maybe - just maybe - I'm doing the right thing.

PROPERTY SUPPORT GROUP REPORT FOR FEBRUARY 2019 CHURCH COUNCIL.

Members: Helen Ives, Nadia Gardner, Derek Gardner, Chris Hawkyard, Dave Holmes (Chairman), John Lunt (Secretary), Judith Ridgway (Steward).

Derek Garner ably reports each month in The Herald about ongoing work and repairs. This present report covers the whole of the period between Church Councils.

In recent months the group has been involved in the replacement of all light units in the Hall (where the Pre-school meets). We decided to

make use of LED strip lights which consume much less energy and should give a longer life. The work was carried out by a team of 'willing helpers' over 2 weekends.

Other work such as routine inspections and servicing of various equipment has proceeded as in previous years and has been reported by Derek for Herald readers.

The leaks in the church and foyer area have been repaired since Christmas and we hope the recent heavy rain has tested them adequately. Some internal decoration is now needed to restore the finish in the church ceiling in 3 areas.

Concerns regarding the poor/outdated state of the toilets, also mentioned in the quinquennial last year, were voiced and we would welcome help/ideas for possible sources of funding before getting estimates. Also noted that this is not a job we could sensibly tackle ourselves.

We feel a simple survey of the roof material (synthetic slates) is worth carrying out in case of risks due to deterioration.

We have one proposal to Church Council for carpet tiles to foyer and corridors as these are in need of replacement now.

If users of our premises find any problem in any of our buildings, please record it in the property book in the foyer almost opposite the coffee hatch. If it's urgent let one of the committee members know.

We are not a closed group and would welcome any help you feel able to give. Normally, this involves only 2 meetings a year and of course any practical skills you can employ in the maintenance of our premises. Just contact a committee member or any of the Church Stewards.

TALKING OF GOD TOGETHER.



Talking of God Together is a new resource which encourages and equips Christians to speak comfortably about their experience of God and the Christian life.

It helps people to take part in conversations with others, both inside and outside the church, about what really matters to them.

The material can be used by small groups and in other settings, including local arrangements for services when no preacher is available.

The material has four sessions, plus a bonus one:

- A present God
- A listening God
- A caring God
- A speaking God
- Jesus as our teacher and model

- Welcome
- Worship
- Word
- Witness
