Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

We are now over half way through Lent, looking towards Holy Week and then Easter morning!

I hope that you have found benefit in keeping Lent this year and that, as we journey through the events of Holy Week together, we will gain a renewed appreciation of the depth and breadth of love that God has for us shown through the death of Jesus, and so be better able to celebrate His resurrection on Easter morning.

It can be tempting to shy away from the events of Jesus' last week and especially Good Friday itself and jump straight to Easter morning. Partly, I think, because the events are so shockingly horrific that we want to look away.

Perhaps there is another reason though too. If we allow ourselves to engage deeply in the journey with Jesus from Palm Sunday to Good Friday, we have no option but to confront ourselves and where we may have stood at each turn of events.

Would we have understood what was happening in the upper room? Would we have even been there? Would we have had some sympathy with Judas' politics? Would we have stayed awake or fallen asleep in the Garden of Gethsemane? Would we have run away when the soldiers appeared or followed into the courtyard?

Would we have stayed loyal under scrutiny or is Peter's response also what ours would have been?

It is tempting to want to look away from ourselves rather than to see ourselves in the light of the narrative. Of course, you and I were not there and we cannot know for sure what we may have done or said, but what about last week, what about today even?

Do we understand what Jesus may be saying to us? Are we willing to follow Him if what He leads us towards is unsettling and radically different from what we know now? Are we willing to watch and pray in order to discern God's will? Will we continue to follow when the going gets tough?

Are there ways that we have denied or betrayed Jesus during these last few days?

It is very tempting not to want to look at ourselves and our church in the light of Holy Week, and yet there can be no true joy and celebration on Easter morning without Good Friday, can there?

Only after we have stood honestly at the foot of the cross can we, on Easter morning, find the stone rolled away and the tomb empty and know without a shadow of doubt that Jesus is alive! That on Good Friday Jesus knew all about us, all about our sins and our failings and died for us still. In His eternal love for us He took all that on Himself, died for us and rose again to new life which He offers to each one of us. A new beginning.

Alleluia! What a Saviour!

May we, all humankind and all of creation, be blessed with new life, a new beginning and a new joy in our Lord, this Easter time. Amen.

"Gay Girl, Good God" – The story of who I was, and who God has always been, by Jackie Hill Perry. Published by B & H Publishing Group at £12.99.

About the Author

Jackie Hill Perry is a writer, poet, and artist whose work has been featured on the Washington Times, The 700 Club, Desiring God, The Gospel

Coalition, and other publications. Since becoming a Christian in 2008, she has been compelled to use her speaking and teaching gifts to share the light of the gospel of God as authentically as she can. At home she is a wife to Preston and Mommy to Eden and Autumn.



This book has been written by someone who says she was once a gay girl. Jackie wants those reading it to say at the end, "God is so good!" She tells the story of how, aged 19, she discovered what it meant to be made new when God broke in and turned her heart towards Him. This did not happen in a church, but in her bedroom. The first person the book is dedicated to is God.

The book is in three parts: the first part is entitled "Who I was", the second "Who I became" and the third "Same sex attraction".

Jackie writes that "Gay Girl, Good God" is about desires that exist because God gave them to us. Homosexual desires exist because sin exists. Eve let her body tell her what she should do with it instead of following God's word, which would have reminded her what her body was made for.

When Jackie became a Christian, she discovered that wanting God over a woman was an entirely new experience. The woman had always come first. The same sex attraction did not just immediately vanish and she had to learn to experience it but not act on it.

One of the things the Lord told her to do was to change the way her way of dressing and dress like a woman. She writes of going into a clothes store being terrified at the sight of women's clothing and wanting to run out!

Jackie wrote the book to tell as in Psalm 66 v 16 what God has done for her soul. She states that the same God who did something wonderful to the soul of the psalmist and an equally beautiful thing to her own soul is able to do the same for every soul alive.

One of the reasons I read this book was to try and understand and it certainly gave me an insight into what life must be like for someone with a same sex attraction.

Editor's note:

Here is a review of a book dealing with a difficult subject which sometimes provokes controversy. Should we, as Christians, ignore it, or approach it openly, and by doing so, put ourselves in a better position to come to an informed opinion? Jackie describes her personal journey. Can we show the love of Jesus by being open and tolerant to the experiences and opinions of another Christian? CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

Our February Church Council was held on the 19th, and for those who are interested, there is a copy of the minutes pinned on the left-hand notice board in the small corridor. There is also a copy of the Trustees' Annual Report which has been lodged with the Charity Commission.

The report is a statuary requirement, setting out how we are governed as a charity and what our aims and objectives are. It sets out some of our achievements over the year to 31st August last, and also the challenges that we face. We also lodge the statuary accounts. They are not with the minutes, but the information can be found in the second column of the accounts with the minutes. They show an excess of expenditure over income of £6644. There is a projected deficit for the current year of approximately £7,200. This means that we are eating into our reserves year on year.

At Council we get reports on all the good work that is being done by various groups and committees and make decisions about capital expenditure and make sure that our buildings are well maintained. (Many thanks to those who actually do the maintenance.) We discuss the plans made by the various groups, including plans for worship and outreach.

As members of the Council, we are also Charity Trustees. As such we are responsible at law for the proper stewardship of the Church's finances and funds, a role which makes us plan with our heads, not just with our hearts.

Many people took on extra responsibilities in the period when we were between ministers, and our thanks are due to everyone who kept everything running so seamlessly, as already reported in the March Herald. I would like in this issue to say thank you on your behalf to our hardworking band of Stewards, ably assisted over that period by some experienced ex-stewards. We were reminded at the last meeting that two of our senior Stewards will be retiring in August. If they cannot be replaced, it will put an intolerable burden on the remaining Stewards.

And now as a Church, we enter a new era. As a Church Council we face many challenges ahead, including our integration into the Macclesfield circuit. But we have so many exciting opportunities to further God's kingdom in our community.

HYMNOLOGY ON A MONDAY MORNING - 40

'Brother Sister, let me serve you'. Words by Richard Gillard, Tune: Richard Gillard's Servant Song.

On Remembrance Sunday 2001, Songs of Praise came from York Minster. The stories were of women who had served in wartime; Women's Land Army, ATYS drivers, the three services and others who were taken from their normal work to serve the war effort. Plans were revealed on that day for a new memorial near the Cenotaph in Central London to commemorate the part played by such women. Every November women will join the men to remember the fallen.

The programme focussed on civilian stories of women in wartime. During the programme, Lieutenant Colonel Jan Ransom, a career soldier, was interviewed. She said the hymn 'Brother, Sister, let me serve you' was the right choice, not only for her, but for all service personnel.

During her interview she said, "When I became a Christian I wondered if it were possible to share my faith in the armed forces. I found myself in Northern Ireland shortly after the Enniskillen bombing where so many died, and at first, I found it very difficult being with soldiers who had lost their friends, or been injured. I hadn't suffered.

Then I realised I could say to them "I've been praying for you." I had changed, no longer wanting to be in command by being powerful, but thinking more of the bible and the verse "The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve."

Mart Rodger

9th March 1936 - 13th March 2019

We are so sad to report the death of Mart Rodger, one of our most well-known members, and we offer our sincere condolences to Janet and the family. Mart & Janet joined us from Disley Methodist church some years ago and ever since have been enthusiastic and faithful members contributing much

to the life of the church and supporting our charitable fund-raising most generously through the medium of Mart's musical talent.

Mart was born in Cheadle Hulme and was the youngest of three brothers. Musical talent was already in the family; his father was a good singer and his mother a very good pianist and they offered their gifts at Cheadle Hulme Methodist Church where they were members.

First, Mart learned to play simple traditional jazz tunes on his brother's guitar and the following Christmas his father bought him a beginner's clarinet on which a friend showed him how to set up the reed and how to finger the instrument. It was only six days later that he played a New Year's Eve gig in Prestwich!

A second, more advanced clarinet followed on his 14th birthday. His brother Keith took Mart to the Grosvenor Hotel in Manchester to hear the Saints Jazz Band as a birthday present in 1950. (Our paths might have crossed at that point, for as a 17-year-old, I too was smitten with the jazz bug – no talent, but enjoyed the music – and attended regularly at the Grosvenor to listen to The Saints.)

Mart then started a band called 'The Hounds of Sound' in the 50s, before joining the Zenith 6 in 1957. Jumping forward several bands, to 1982, Mart Rodger and Janet were in New Orleans, the birth place of jazz. At Maison Bourbon on Bourbon Street he was invited to "sit in" with the resident band and the audience response to his playing was exciting and exhilarating.

On the way back to their hotel Janet said "Why don't you start a band called Mart Rodger Manchester Jazz when we get home?" So in October 1982, the band played its first performance. Since then they have played all over the world – Scandinavia, U.S.A., Canada, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Ireland as well as on four transatlantic cruises.

They have played at many local venues and around Great Britain, also supporting charities including The Francis Hospice for Children in Didsbury and The East Cheshire Hospice. They have often played in village halls where a donation is made for these charities. Over £1000 has been given to St Luke's Hospice in Winsford. Various amounts have also gone to the East Cheshire Hospice and to Ashgate Hospice and Friends of Bakewell Hospital.

The band has been invited regularly to many Jazz Festivals both home and abroad. Humphrey Lyttelton, Cy Laurie, Marion Montgomery, and Yank Lawson (Bob Crosby's Bob Cats fame) have all shared in wonderful jazz evenings with Mart Rodger Manchester Jazz.

Mart will be remembered for his musical virtuosity, as a family man, his sense of humour, his faith, and his humility. Famous in jazz circles the world over, he remained an unassuming bloke sitting next to you in church.

I have a number of his recordings. I will continue to play and enjoy them as I am reminded of that remarkable manual dexterity and inventiveness that produced such thrilling sounds.

THE RETURN TO MACCLESFIELD

After one of our recent services at Green Close whilst enjoying the usual tea and cake, the conversation turned to the upcoming move to the Macclesfield Circuit. It was mentioned that Green Close used to be part of the Macclesfield Circuit and as we look forward to joining it again in September, it is interesting to recall the history of Green Close.

The following extract has been taken from the Green Close Centenary Handbook produced in 1961:

"In the year 1797 seventeen members of the Methodist Conference, because of differences on doctrine and Church government with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, the parent body of the Wesleys, met at Leeds and drafted a new Constitution, which was to be known as the Methodist New Connexion.

The newly-formed branch wanted a more democratic system to permit duly elected laymen to share with Ministers church legislation, to administer in their own Chapels the Sacrament which hitherto was the prerogative of the established Church and a complete separation from the Church of England. Repercussions were widespread and the Methodist cause at Pott Shrigley originated at that very time.

In spite of severe opposition from the local gentry who owned the estate, the Society increased. Regular services were held, a strong Class meeting was formed and the influence upon the life of the Parish became a power that had to be recognised.

1814 recorded an important event – the Society at Pott Shrigley became attached to the Macclesfield Park Street Circuit. Services were held in cottages in the neighbourhood, most frequently at a cottage at Unwin Pool, which bore the text 'Prepare to meet thy God'. Cottage prayer meetings took place throughout the Parish with good effect which can be traced down through the years to the present time.

The opposition from the landowner became more intense and the hope of purchasing a plot of land on which to build a Church appeared to be hopeless, but a site was secured from Mr James Clayton, owner of Green Close Farm and founder of the Chapel.

James Clayton purchased Green Close Farm from William Green in 1837, which was acquired by Lord Newton of Burslem, Staffs, in 1882. The plot of 220 square yards was conveyed to the Methodist New Connexion Model Deed on December 29th 1846, during the Ministry of the Rev. William Ford of the Macclesfield Park Street Circuit. On this ground the existing Chapel was built so that the name 'Green Close' now so widely known, has a treasured and historic origin.

It is evident that although the land had been secured, real determination, self-sacrifice and effort was needed to raise the necessary finance to build the Chapel. When it became known that this was the intention of the Methodists opposition from certain individuals of influence became more severe. Notwithstanding, the band of loyal workers were ultimately successful. It is recorded that the first subscription of two shillings and six pence was made by Mr James Clayton. Some idea of the tremendous struggle is apparent when it is realised that some fifteen years elapsed before the vision was fulfilled.

Much of the labour and preparation was undertaken by voluntary workers and the first load of stone was carted from Bollington by Mr



Date of opening was October 31st 1861. Preacher Rev. Thomas Gutteridge and the first Trust of the new Chapel was formed in November 1862 under the Ministry of the Rev S Smith.

In 1932 the Methodist Union was consummated. The Rev Dr Scott Lidgett was inducted as its first President. A special united meeting was held at Park Lane Church.

After Methodist Union it was felt that geographically Green Close Chapel should be included in the Poynton Circuit. There was much opposition from the Macclesfield circuit to this proposed arrangement, but in 1935 the amalgamation was effected. The last quarterly meeting in the Macclesfield circuit with which Green Close was directly concerned was in June1935, under the ministry of Rev Rueben Key and the Rev William Cherry, when many contributions were made to the loyalty of our Church, which had been attached to Macclesfield from 1814 to 1935 and expressions of good wishes for the work of Green Close in the Poynton circuit. At their September 1935 quarterly meeting we were welcomed into the Poynton circuit under the ministry of the Rev F L Buxton."

Eighty-four years on and another step in our history is almost upon us. There will be some sadness when it is time to say goodbye to all our friends and fellow Methodists now joining the Stockport United Circuit but the members of Green Close are looking forward with positivity to returning to the Macclesfield Circuit.

ANNIVHAITI CELEBRATION CONCERT

Our Church Anniversary weekend coincided with the culmination of our Haiti Project, so we had two reasons to celebrate on Saturday 9th March. We did so in the form of a concert performed by church members and friends who willingly gave of their time once they realised that resistance to David Garrett's invitation was futile.

The church area had been arranged café-style as we took our seats at tables to begin with a slideshow, an account of the inspiration for the project which then moved into a reminder of all the events that we had mounted in order to raise funds while enjoying our fellowship together.

Hilary Garrett read a passage from 'Treasure Island' with contributions from Stephen Hughes and then we enjoyed a medley of familiar music from Disney performed by the David Garrett ensemble (the three Garretts, Zoe Dawson and Catharine Hughes), punctuated by a comedy interlude starring a very welcome guest, Chris Cotton.

The Haiti brick-building competition hosted by Mandy Hawkyard rounded off the first half of the evening – never has cardboard been trickier!

We chomped, slurped and chatted our way through the interval before assembling again to sing Amazing Grace accompanied by Jean Lunt on the bagpipes and David Garrett on piano.

Phil Maltby-Parkinson interviewed Roger Drinkwater about the amalgamation of the Clumber Road and Park Lane churches which formed PMC and the building and opening of our church. Roger Drinkwater, the Treasurer of the Fund-Raising Committee gave a good account of those eventful times.

Then followed a piano interlude of four well-known jazz classics played expertly and exuberantly by David Garrett after which Phil enquired from David about his music, past and present.

The music continued with the Musician Mob – (The David Garrett ensemble augmented by Theo Eaves, Sally Holmes and Stephen Hughes) – playing 'When the Saints Go Marching In'.

A final Fundraising Appeal and Thanks was given by Mandy Hawkyard and we learned the following day that about £1200 was added to the fund that night – a truly remarkable amount for which the Project Haiti Committee is extremely grateful.

The evening finished with the Musician Mob and Audience playing and singing— 'Come and Join the Celebration' — words especially written for the Haiti Project by Margaret Wilson.

Dare I add — "A good time was had by all."?

CHURCH ROOF/CARPETS

The recent repair to the roof has unfortunately not resolved all problems. It seems OK in 'normal' rain. However, in gale force conditions the water is infiltrating along the leading edge of the tiles. The underpinnings of the roof, viz; roof felt etc. is not coping sufficiently, allowing ingress into the building. The roof has been problematical occasionally for a number of years. It seems that the time has come to strip all of the roof to the left, and partially to the right of the front main doors. We are awaiting an estimate, which may be quite large?

The knock-on effect is that we have had to postpone the fitting of new carpet to the lobby and corridors as previously planned. We will update all as soon as possible.

'HOLEY' CHURCH

The general construction of the Church is quite pleasant visually. We do try to avoid where possible, drilling into the brickwork and making holes for obvious reasons. If you 'think' this may be necessary, please refer to a member of the Property Group first. Some walls have taken on the look of Gruyere cheese. We also find old string, blue tack, old Sellotape and pins dotted about the place like confetti. The need for notices is important for many reasons and the Methodist Church could not survive without them, but can you remove old ones not required and consider all aspects when putting up new ones? Sellotape is particularly difficult on sensitive surfaces and glass. We will not put up a notice about this!!!

JUST SCRIPTURE POYNTON-PHILIPPINES LINK-UP

Just Scripture is a new initiative from Christian Aid facilitating groups in the UK to share Bible study sessions with partners in different parts of the world. A group of 9 people from our congregation met in the prayer corner and connected to a group from Christian Aid's partner in the Philippines by Skype. We were also joined here by Wendy and Jude from Christian aid and Nancy (from Brazil) and Bob (from Kenya) who are the theology advisors for the project. We started with a short act of worship lighting three candles here as they lit three candles there and we said prayers together.

Then we got down to the hard work and started to look at a passage from Paul's letter to the Romans (8.18-25). We discussed various aspects of the passage in twos and threes separately, then shared our ideas in the two different locations and finally we shared are ideas with each other over Skype. It was fascinating and inspiring to see both the similarities and differences in how both groups interpreted the passages.

The passage talks about how both humanity and creation are groaning as if in labour but waiting in hope for what we cannot yet see. We discussed how these words relate to how we are all currently affected by climate change. We learnt of the use of solar power, both on the roof of our building and by Filipino fisher-people luring squid to their boats with solar lights. We also learnt how illegal and destructive fishing practices are destroying reefs and mangroves and hence the food that the local communities live on and of how Christian Aid is supporting work to protect the reefs and replant the mangroves. We came to realise that the group in the Philippines were so much more connected with the environment in which they live than we are but, perhaps as a consequence, more likely to suffer along with it than we are.

I really appreciated the experience. It was wonderful to feel that we were gaining so much from a community of people who we normally give to. It was talk with the people engaged in spending the money we raise for Christian Aid. It made me proud to be a supporter of Christian Aid and confident that the money is being spent prayerfully and effectively.

LAY PASTORING IN BRAMHALL

Shortly after I took up the role of Lay Pastor in Bramhall Arnold asked me to write an article about what the role entailed. I told him I couldn't do so until I found out myself. It's taken eighteen months but I now feel in a position to start reporting back.

I've done quite a lot of worship leading, we have four regular services a week, two on Sunday morning, one on Sunday evening and another on Thursday morning. This has been a great way to get to know the congregations. I've also done a reasonable amount of pastoral visiting as the job title might indicate.

Other than this most of my time has been spent looking at ways to reach out to those on the margins of the church and further afield. Bramhall is quite an affluent area and it wasn't obvious at first what the church had to offer the area, but the statistics show that just about everywhere is affected by a mental health epidemic at the moment.

So I've started up a series of life classes for people with low mood and anxiety called "Living Life to the Full". It's based on Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) and developed by experts in Glasgow. We started off running a Christian version "Living Life to the Full with God" for members of local congregations and in January offered a secular version to the local community. That was sold out and we've just started up a second series. We've had local GPs referring people to come to this church-based activity and it looks as if it is going to continue.

We're now starting to explore what we can do for people after they've completed the 8 sessions and the possibility of opening a drop-in café one evening a week. Further down the line we will need to understand what "church" can mean to the people who come to us through this route and how this compares to what "church" means to us.

Having Camilla, the Duchess of Cornwall as our President presumably helped in this. Chris and I were invited to its launch held in the Science Museum in London with the Duchess in attendance and were delighted to accept. Around 200 people gathered to hear from our CEO, Claire Severgnini, and the Duchess who spoke very movingly about her mother who had suffered with this disease. The family wished to understand what had happened to her, and if there were preventative measures they could take to prevent it happening to them. Claire and the Duchess then formally unveiled the Royal Osteoporosis Society's new logo.



The Duchess' visit also marked the launch of the world's first Osteoporosis and Bone Research Academy, which will bring together leading researchers, clinicians and academics in the field, to advance scientific knowledge of the disease and drive the research for the development of new medication and treatments and hopefully a cure.

There is now a support group in Stockport which meets at Hazel Grove Tennis Club on Douglas Road. If you know anyone recently diagnosed with osteoporosis please give them my name and phone number. It can be a very frightening diagnosis and to talk with other people in a similar situation can be very helpful.
