Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I wonder how prepared you are for Christmas? Have you bought your cards? What about your presents? Have you decided where to buy your turkey? What about your sprouts? Perhaps you have already written all your cards or perhaps you haven't even started thinking about it!

It is very easy to get caught up in the busyness of the Christmas season earlier and earlier each year... and many retail outlets encourage us in this frenzy. Certainly there is a lot that does need organising if you want to be ready for Christmas Day.

Before we get to Christmas Day though we have the gift of the Advent Season, the four weeks running up to Christmas Day. 'Travels with a Primate' – Around the world with Robert Runcie by Terry Waite. Published by SPCK at £8.99.

Regular readers of this feature will realise that Terry Waite is one of my favourite authors. I have reviewed most of his books and this one does not disappoint. I love the mixture of humour and historical and geographic facts.

Terry Waite accompanied Archbishop Runcie on his journeys throughout the Anglican communion. He was the Archbishop's Advisor on Anglican Communion Affairs and his travels covered a long period of time.

I found great comfort in the book when Terry says that he won't comment on a service or Conference as he hasn't the slightest recollection of what was said or discussed.

The cover reminds me of a lovely story of a visit to a rural backwater in Canada (Terry can't remember the name of the place) where a local church wanted to do their best for the visit of the Archbishop, The church was too small to fit in all those who wanted to see the Archbishop so it was decided that he would go in a vehicle through the streets with his Chaplain and Terry. They really wanted a 'Popemobile' but there were none in Canada and to import one would have cost a fortune. They decided to make one by using a pick-up truck from a local garage with a structure on the back that looked rather like a primitive greenhouse covered in polythene. The last chapter of the book goes back to Terry being kidnapped in the middle East and describes his return to the UK with Richard Chartres, the Chaplain and his former travelling companion. Archbishop Runcie was one of the first on the plane when Terry arrived back in the UK. Terry had had many years of silence and when he saw him, he simply said, "Dr Runcie, I presume?"

IDEAS FROM CAFÉ CHURCH

Ros led Café Church on 20 October. Thinking about the consequences of our actions on the planet, the church put forward a wide range of suggestions of things we should feel positive about doing.

The church has already undertaken a number of endeavours to conserve, so it was interesting to see what other ideas were being discussed. Some of the ideas focused on recycling more. Others addressed our responsibility to reduce our use of resources or re-use things rather than recycling. Some also focused on our capacity to influence others.

The list below captures the ideas shared with stewards following the service, but there will be other ideas we have not yet registered and we are keen to hear what excites you:

*Plant a wildflower meadow *Promote and supply recycled Christmas wrapping

*Get a dishwasher to cut down our use of water, heating the water and detergent

*Replace all our lights with LEDs, switch off lights or use sensors to switch them off automatically



*Address our insulation/consider other ways we reduce our use of fossil fuels, while ensuring we remain welcoming and have our doors open

*Determine to always buy local

*Determine to always buy food without packaging

*Become 'default veggie' - only serving vegetarian meals

*Host events to promote green / environmentally friendly positions *Have an 'ideas' page in the Herald to encourage ongoing discussions

PROPERTY UPDATE

- * The front main Church door has been adjusted to allow for more effective closing.
- * Light in hall repaired.
- * Repair to emergency light in foyer area.
- * Sink in kitchen unblocked.
- * New 100w LED spotlight fitted over external cross at main door.
- * Cable protection fitted to Church keyboard.
- * Repair to window in Hall ladies' toilet.
- * Heater fitted over front main door.
- * Radiators bled.
- * Church and Hall boilers serviced by outside contractors.

CHAIRS

As you are probably aware various issues are under discussion regarding how the Church presents itself. One of these is the chairs in the worship area. There are now 5 chairs available for 'evaluation' in the Church. If you have a moment try them out and see what you think. A final decision has not been taken on them; It is envisaged any replacements will be lighter and capable of being stacked on a moveable trolley device.

WORSHIP AREA DOORS

If these are retained in the fully open position it is necessary to ensure the two aluminium 'u' section strips are in position in the floor door guides. This is a Health and Safety issue to prevent people with heels tripping over.

ROOF

The estimated date to start the roof repair is now 8th January 2020. This though, is still dependent upon the weather which has caused the current delay along with asbestos removal issues. We will update you nearer the time as access and exit points will be affected.

WASTE REMOVAL COMPANY

The company that removes PMC waste is STE WASTE. They own the large black (general waste) and the blue (paper and card only) waste bins which live outside the kitchen door. I recently completed the PMC annual waste return required by the Environment Agency to STE WASTE. Within that procedure I was made aware that this company, along with the National Trust, have planted 25,000 trees at Lyme Park, Dunham Massey and Tatton Park to celebrate being in business for 25 years. They also thanked PMC for extending business to them over a number of years. Thought you may wish to know.

On the next page is **Philip Hagreen's** (1923 to 1955) **"Natus est"** (He is born) which consists of 6 small prints on paper, mounted together. It is from the Methodist Modern Art Collection No. HAG/2007 (Image Copyright © Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes. The Methodist Church Registered Charity no. 1132208)

Luke 1.39-56; 2.1-16; Matthew 1.16; 18-25; 2.1-2; 11

These beautifully simple woodcuts illustrate the birth of Jesus and are supplemented with liturgical texts and a quotation from Psalm 8. There are various views of the holy family, one with the shepherds worshipping at the stable. At the top left is Mary's visit to her cousin Elizabeth, the future mother of John the Baptist. Hagreen was a member of the Guild of St. Joseph and St. Dominic, a community of Roman Catholic artists and craftspeople committed to high quality work and design, offered to the glory of God. The style chosen is part of a desire to recover traditional Christian craftsmanship using the designs of the early Middle Ages and ancient devotional practice.
